



Heartworms are a serious and potentially fatal disease that affect pets across the U.S. Learn how your pet can contract heartworms - and most importantly, how to prevent them.

How Does My Pet Get Heartworms?

- **Transmission by Mosquitoes:** Pets become infected when bitten by a mosquito carrying heartworm larvae. These larvae enter the pet's bloodstream and eventually mature into adult worms.
- Not Contagious Between Pets: Heartworms can't be spread through casual contact, food, or water-only through mosquito bites.
- **Dogs at Higher Risk:** While cats and ferrets can also get heartworms, dogs are the natural host and are more likely to suffer serious symptoms if untreated.

What Can I Do to Prevent It?

- **Monthly Preventatives:** The easiest and most effective method is monthly heartworm prevention medication (oral, topical, or injectable).
- **Routine Testing:** Even if your dog is on prevention, yearly heartworm testing is essential to ensure no breakthrough infections.
- **Control Mosquitoes:** Reduce your pet's exposure by keeping them indoors during peak mosquito times and eliminating standing water around your home.
- **Never Skip Doses:** A single missed month can leave your pet vulnerable. Set reminders or use apps to stay on track!

What Are the Signs of Heartworm Disease?

- Coughing
- Fatigue after moderate activity
- Loss of appetite
- Weight loss
- Swollen abdomen (advanced stages)
