Why Socialization Matters

- Helps dogs feel more confident around new people, animals, and environments.
- Reduces the likelihood of fear-based aggression or anxiety.
- Builds trust between you and your dog.
- Improves adaptability to real-world situations like vet visits, parks, or crowds.

When to Start Socializing

- **Puppies:** Begin as early as 8–16 weeks, during their prime learning stage.
- **Rescues or Adult Dogs:** It's never too late! Go slow, and build positive experiences.

How to Socialize Your Dog

- Expose them gradually to different people, pets, sounds, and environments.
- Use treats, praise, and play to create positive associations.
- Keep sessions short and stress-free. Don't overwhelm your dog.
- Visit dog-friendly parks, training classes, or pet stores.
- Watch body language—if they're fearful or overstimulated, take a break.

Tips for Socializing Rescues

- Let them adjust to your home before introducing new people or pets.
- Use routines to build their confidence and predictability.
- Celebrate small wins, like calmly walking past another dog or greeting a stranger.
